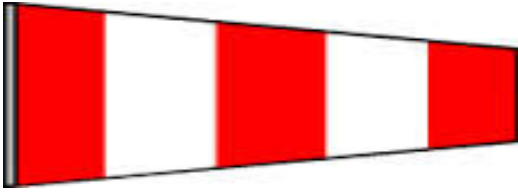


FLAG INSTRUCTIONS

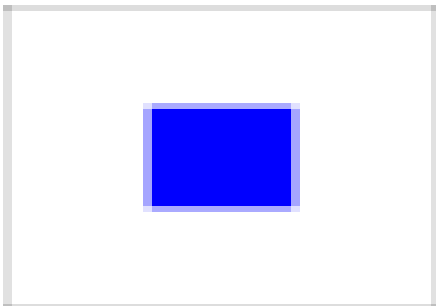
FOR THE OFFICER OF THE DAY

The flags available to the OOD on race day are:



AP = Raise this flag if you wish to delay the start of the race and make 2 sound signals. (In addition you may also announce this delay over the radio). The 'Warning Signal' shall sound 1 minute after its removal.

The OOD may, at their discretion, delay the start of a race if a competitor has indicated to you their intention to race and are delayed by either a lack of water or a technical issue that can be resolved within 15 minutes. (It is the Clubs intention to allow a certain amount of leeway in the racing programme in an effort to include all those who wish to race, within reason)



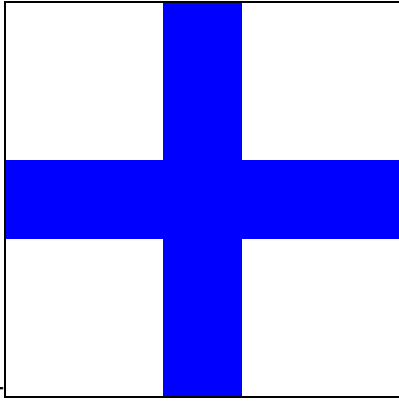
S = Raise this flag if you wish to shorten the course and make 2 sound signals.

This flag is raised as the leading boat, in each class if appropriate, nears the next mark on their course. Once round this mark they should head for the finish line from the direction of this last mark. (Namely, if this mark was either H or E then the finish line should be crossed from East to West. If from any other course mark the finish line should be crossed from West to East.)

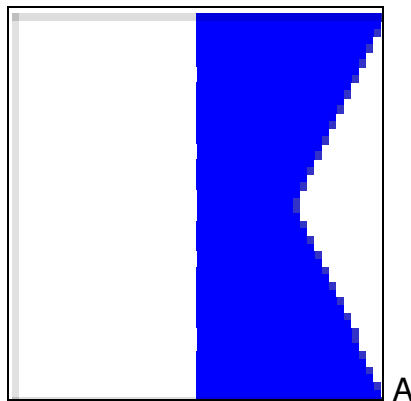
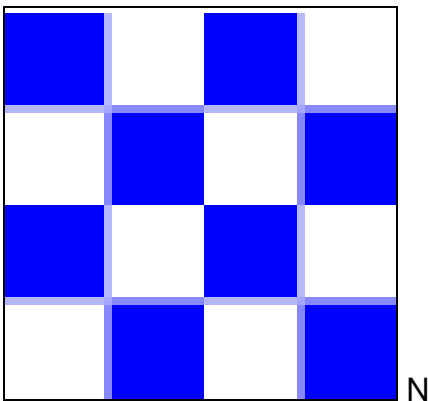
FLAG INSTRUCTIONS

FOR THE OFFICER OF THE DAY



X = Individual recall. Raise this flag and make 1 sound signal if one or more boats did not start correctly and must return back and do a proper start.

The X flag is displayed until the earliest of the following: all boats over the line early have returned correctly, 4 minutes from the start or until one minute before the next start. (The sound signal is in addition to the start sound signal).



Flag N above flag A = All races are abandoned. No more racing today. Raise these flags and make three sound signals.

Flags E, J, & O are the 'class' flags used where more than one race starts on the same day. These are used, primarily, for the Fife Regatta, but may be used on other occasions as deemed necessary. If these 'class' flags are to be used then the details of which flag represents which race shall appear in that days 'Notice of Race'.
